

## DESCRIPTIONS

	<p><b>NORWAY (RED) PINE.</b> This moderately tall (70-120 ft) pine with a narrow trunk is one of the most planted species in northern United States. Although it is mostly grown as a timber tree (for pulpwood), the red pine is also used as a windbreak due to its dense canopy and broad growth. With a moderate growth rate, this pine tolerates sandy soils but does not adapt to wet shallow soils. The red pine derives its name from its reddish-brown scaly bark which, as it ages, transitions to form wide, flat-topped ridges.</p>
	<p><b>WHITE SPRUCE.</b> A straight, tall tree easily recognized by its needles with year round color. Known for needles and cones that always hang down. Beautiful year-round color. Tolerates most soil conditions but grows best on heavier soils and needs more moisture than pines. Makes a good Christmas tree, as well as a good windbreak and ornamental tree. Height: 50-75 feet. Tolerant to shade.</p>
	<p><b>COLORADO BLUE SPRUCE.</b> A classic choice for a Christmas tree or landscaping focal point, this spruce reaches a height of 40'-90' with a 10'-20' spread. Its silvery-blue needles are prickly to the touch and aromatic. Very popular evergreen with no trimming needed as branches densely cover with stiff gray-blue needles. Can be used for accent, windbreak or tall screen. Grows best in full sun to partial shade on heavier soils.</p>
<p><b>SUGAR MAPLE.</b> A landscape standout with medium to dark-green leaves which turn burnt orange or red in fall. Tolerates shade, likes a well-drained, moderately moist, fertile soil. Do not plant in confined spaces. Best known for its syrup, shade, and fall beauty but as firewood has few rivals – it splits easily and gives off an enormous amount of heat with few sparks.</p>	
<p><b>HYBRID POPLAR.</b> A symmetrical, dark green, fast growing tree with large leaves that is easy to grow. Drought tolerant, once it gets established, this tree will thrive in almost any climate condition and do as well in even poor soils. Vertical growth can be 4' – 7' per year and grows to approximately 50 feet with a spread of 30 feet. Will not survive in shade, arid areas, or sites that have standing water. Roots should be planted 1 to 2 feet deep.</p>	
<p><b>BURR OAK.</b> Large, long-lived stately tree. Tolerant of a variety of moisture and soil conditions and adapts well to urban settings. Its fringed acorns are food for wildlife (squirrels, wood ducks, and deer). Preferring full sun, the burr oak can grow to a height of 100 feet and be well over 100 years old. Drought tolerant due to its long taproot, this oak is found in all areas of the country, from northern Wisconsin to Texas.</p>	



**AMERICAN PLUM.** Once established, could grow 4-6 feet a year early in their life span. Diameter increase on a good site will be about an inch per year. First year performance is very dependent on moisture and sunlight availability. Will not survive in shade, arid areas, or sites that have standing water. Lives 30 years or more and grows up to 25 feet in height.



**COMMON LILAC.** A medium to large hardy shrub with stout, spreading branches developing an oval rounded crown. Grows to a height of 8'-15' with a spread of 6' -12'. Very fragrant and showy blossoms in May. Sun to partial shade; range of soil types including heavy soil. Attractive green foliage. Good for screen.



**RED SPLENDOR CRABAPPLE.** A deservedly popular ornamental tree that's smothered in fragrant pink flowers in spring and small edible red fruit in fall. Provides excellent wildlife food if the succulent crabapples last through jelly making season. This tree is an exceptional ornamental accent for home landscape and needs well-drained soil and full sun. Growing to a height and spread of 20 feet, this tree grows at a medium rate and under ideal conditions can be expected to live for 50 years.



**SNOWBERRY.** Snowberries have dainty pink flowers that appear in July, accented with blue-green foliage which produce large white berries. Hummingbirds love the flowers, and in the fall the white berries are an excellent food for birds. The berries hang on all season so they offer winter and spring landscape interest. Bush is good for holding soil on steep banks and prefers sun and moist conditions. A dense, twiggy shrub that grows 5-6' high and 3-6' wide, it is a delicate looking plant with egg white berries that seem to float in the air. Berries are only for wildlife consumption.

**HONEYCRISP APPLE.** A moderately vigorous tree characterized by fruit of exceptional crispness and juicy texture, this tree does best in coldest areas of the country. Ranked as one of the highest quality apples in sensory evaluations, the harvest season ranges from mid-September to mid October. White fleshed apples, are medium to large, ripen evenly, and hold well onto the tree. Flavor of fruit is sweet with little trace of acidity, instantly refreshing with a 'soft' crunch unlike the hard crisp crunch of some apples.



**BLUERAY BLUEBERRY.** Light blue, extra-large berries with extra-sweet taste which resists cracking. Ripening in July, this berry will produce buckets of delicious, aromatic blueberries. The 5' tall bushes have pink blooms in spring and become a blaze of crimson in the fall, so they are ideal arranged as an informal hedge. Cold hardy and self-pollinating, but will produce more berries if planted with another pollinator.





# Jack Pine Containerized Seedlings Available

*Do you want a truly indigenous tree?*

**Trees are now available for purchase from seeds harvested in Polk County.**

These year-old trees are grown in small containers (plugs) and will be ready to plant in April, 2017. Containerized seedlings have a much higher survival rate when compared to traditional bare-root seedlings.

Jack pine is a fast-growing small – to medium-sized coniferous tree, and is an important source of pulpwood, lumber and round timber used for telephone poles, fence posts, mine timbers and railroad ties. Even though jack pine prefers sandy to loam soils, jack pine has proven to grow in any type of soil as long as it is not kept moist. Jack Pine is extremely drought tolerant and requires full sun.

In addition to being a fast growing pine, Jack pine is used for cover and nesting by mourning doves, and as a food source by a variety of birds (gold finches and robins consume seeds), squirrels and porcupines. However, it serves as habitat and breeding area for the federally endangered Kirtland’s warbler (also known as the jack pine warbler, photo on right). This song bird requires large areas of dense young jack pine for its breeding habitat.
