

The St. Croix National Scenic Riverway is made up of the St. Croix and Namekagon rivers and the riparian setting through which they flow. Overall administration lies with the National Park Service, U.S. Department of the Interior. The lower St. Croix River below Stillwater, Minnesota, is administered by the Minnesota and Wisconsin departments of natural resources as are five state parks, three state forests, and two wildlife refuges within the Federal zone. Douglas, Burnett, and Washburn counties administer forest lands along the upper St. Croix and Namekagon rivers. Near Namekagon Lake, the river flows through the Chequamegon National Forest, and near the mouth of the Yellow River the St. Croix flows by a portion of the reservation owned by the St. Croix Band of Chippewa.


St. Croix National Scenic Riverway

River distances are shown every 5 miles (8 kilometers). The St. Croix River is measured from the Mississippi River. The Namekagon River is measured from the St. Croix River.
